From the Rector Mr David Bovey

Dear Parents

The recent winter tournament week was for many of our young men the climax of a very busy few months. Those who were involved during this particular week had the opportunity to test themselves against some of the very best teams from throughout the country. A number of the teams did well, exceeding their own expectations while others did not do as well as they had hoped.

The same applies to other areas of school life. Those involved in cultural activities have also competed or performed often during the year. All of these very worthwhile endeavours place demands on a young man's time. And amidst all this busyness, we must remember that the primary focus for our young men must be academic. At the time of writing, the seniors will be coming to the end of their school examinations which are crucial as preparation for the external examinations later in the year. People contacted us to let us know how impressed they were with the conduct of our young men; how positive, courteous, respectful they were. Oftentimes these standards are not easy to maintain when we see the way some top sportspeople conduct themselves on the field. From the Deputy Rector

Senior Examinations

As you read this, young men in the senior school will have completed their school examinations and,

in most instances, have received the grades from these important assessments. As the assessment papers are marked, and moderation processes completed, grades will become available for parents to view via the Parent Portal. I encourage your interest in these examinations. While some young men may claim that they are only 'mock', or not important because they do not count for credits, the opposite is the case. These examinations will provide both your son and his teachers with a concrete indication of his progress to date in the Achievement Standards to be assessed in the external examinations. As such, the feedback that your son receives will be vital for his preparation for these examinations, and will also help to inform the programmes that teachers implement in the short time remaining at school for senior students.

Achieving the best assessment grades that he can will assist your son to leave as many future pathways open to him as possible. It is important that he begins his preparation for the external examinations as soon as possible. The human brain learns through repetition. Short periods of revision over a long period of time will leave your son much better prepared, with information stored in his memory and able to be retrieved when required, than will 'cramming' at the last minute. While the prospect of spending the school holidays revising is unlikely to appeal to many young men, it does provide parents with an opportunity to help Winter Tournament Week:

- Badminton Senior A team won Division II; Senior B team fourth in the same division
- Basketball the Prem A team won the regional qualifying tournament; the U16 team finished third at their tournament in New Plymouth
- Football the 1st XI finished 30th at the NZSS tournament in Napier; the 2nd XI finished fifth at their tournament, and the Junior team ninth.
- Golf the Senior A team finished seventh at the NZSS Championships in Hastings.
- Hockey the 1st XI finished third at the Rankin Cup; the 2nd XI won the Galletly Cup, the national tournament for 2nd XIs and the U15 Colts won the Tanner Cup.
- Rugby the U16 team won their annual quad tournament for the first time since 2009; the U15 Colts finished ninth at the National Invitational tournament in Wellington; the U14 team finished sixth at the Colquhoun tournament hosted by PNBHS.
- Table Tennis the Senior A team finished seventh in A Grade at the NZSS Championships in Palmerston North.
- Wrestling Jack Scrimshaw won two gold medals, a silver and also had a fourth placing at the NZ Wrestling Championships.
- Loves Me Not a programme delivered in conjunction with the police, the Loves Me Not programme was delivered to the Year 12 boys and is based around healthy and respectful relationships.
- Golf Greg Shaw finished eighth at the NZ U19 Championships.
- Triathlon Adam Martin finished third in the U19 Sprint Race at the ITU World Triathlon Finals in Rotterdam, Netherlands. Older brother and recent Old Boy David finished fifth.

their sons put in place a plan to maximise the time available to them over the coming weeks. Examination leave for senior students begins at the end-of-school on Friday, November 3.

Junior Examinations

The end-of-year examinations for junior students (November 6 – 10) are likewise very important. These examinations will provide your son with a very concrete picture of his progress during the second half of this year, and, most importantly, provide him with feedback so that he can continue his academic development. The upcoming school holidays will provide an opportune time for you to work with your son to ensure that his notes are up-to-date and that he has completed homework tasks that have been set. Developing a revision timetable is another important task parents can assist with. Young men tend to spend more time revising the things they enjoy the most or are already good at. However, it is those things that your son finds difficult that really need the greatest emphasis.

Global Trends - Boys' Education

The recent Australia-New Zealand regional conference hosted by the International Boys' Schools Coalition (IBSC) was themed 'Bucking the trend: What works for boys.' The trend referred to in the conference title is one of boys underachievement. Globally there is a growing gap between the educational achievement of girls and boys. This gap is apparent in both New Zealand and Australian schools. However, page 3

in neither country do central government have any plan for addressing this gap, somewhat at odds with the emphasis that has justifiably been placed on lifting achievement levels for underperforming groups in recent years. In New Zealand, at NCEA Level Two the achievement gap is small, about 4%, and has narrowed over recent years. However, at NCEA Level Three the gap between the achievement of girls and boys is closer to 13%.

Boys' schools are cognizant of the vital role they play in addressing this situation and in New Zealand research undertaken in recent years indicates clearly that boys who attend boys' schools are more likely to achieve NCEA and Scholarship qualifications than boys who attend coeducational schools. The Association of Boys' Schools New Zealand has commissioned research in an attempt to understand in more detail why this is and we look forward to being able to share this with you on the coming years.

The deliberate crafting of school culture was identified at the IBSC conference as an essential common element of the work of boys' schools. In boys' schools, it was noted, striving for academic excellence is a given. It is the 'extras' that are offered though that make a difference in terms of engaging young men and assisting them to find meaning in what they are doing. Consequently, we place great emphasis on our school vision, To Develop Educated Men of Outstanding Character, as we believe the work that we do, in partnership with our parent body and school community, is so important in shaping our future generations so that they might flourish for their own good and the good of our wider community and society.

Glow Kids

The soft, warm glow highlights the glassy eyes hypnotically staring at the screen. It could be pretty much any time, day or night. Sound familiar? Glow kids, the term used to describe those illuminated by their screens, is the title of a recent publication by addiction expert Dr Nicholas Kardaras. Kardaras weaves together the results of research into the effects of internet use and screen time on adolescents and his own, sometimes shocking, clinical experiences dealing with young people who have been caught out by the deliberately addictive nature of computer games and the internet.

Many of the statistics, anecdotes and stories from practice shared by Kardaras are concerning and certainly deserving of our attention. A number of salient points have been collated below:

There is no credible research that shows children exposed to more technology at an earlier age have better educational outcomes than technology-free children.

There is an increasing amount of clinical research correlating screen time with disorders such as ADHD, addiction, anxiety, depression and increased anxiety.

Brain-imaging studies indicate that excessive screen exposure can neurologically damage a young person's developing brain in the same way that cocaine addiction does. Screen addiction is more difficult to treat than cocaine addiction. There is no regulation of 'screens'. Furthermore, children – the most vulnerable to the effects of screen time - are deliberately targeted by video game makers.

Video games stimulate the 'flight or fight' centres of the brain that were responsible for human survival over many thousands of years. However, unlike our ancestors, whose brains were able to rest after the threat had dissipated, video games are specifically designed to maintain this sense of arousal, something people are not evolved to cope with.

Any time there is arousal, there can be addiction. The more frequent the arousal, the greater the chance of addiction.

Many young people are being placed in a vicious cycle of arousal; "The more I stimulate a child, the more I need to keep stimulating that child in order to hold his or her attention. As with a drug addict, tolerance and desensitization develop, and the hyper stimulated child needs everincreasing levels of visual stimulation to continue to stay engaged."

For 20 years, beginning in the 1960's, a longitudinal German study identified a 1% per year loss of sensory awareness in university students as a result of exposure to television. While 1% might not sound like a lot, over a twenty-year period it is significant. Kardaras points out that this study concluded in the early 1980's, well before the advent of laptop computers, tablets or the ubiquitous smartphone, all devices likely to have a greater impact on the human brain than the television programmes of the 1970's and 1980's.

In a 2011 New York Times article it was revealed that many tech executives and engineers working for Silicon Valley companies chose to have their children educated in Waldorf schools because of their educational philosophy that eschews technology. Steve Jobs was a notoriously lowtech parent. Silicon Valley tech executives and engineers enroll their kids in no-tech Waldorf Schools. Google founders Sergey Brin and Larry Page went to no-tech Montessori Schools, as did Amazon creator Jeff Bezos and Wikipedia founder Jimmy Wales.

Education psychologist Dr Jane Healy reported, after years of research into the impact of computers on children's education, that "time on the computer might interfere with development of everything from the young child's motor skills to his or her ability to think logically and distinguish between reality and fantasy."

Kardaras posits that to get ahead in an increasingly tech savvy world young people need sharper minds, capable of critical and creative thinking and problem solving. He highlights the irony in this, with "research clearly showing us that screens are dulling rather than sharpening young developing brains."

The access of young people to pornography, especially violent pornography, is warping their understanding of what is appropriate and expected behaviour in their relationships with females. At the aforementioned IBSC conference one presenter explained that there is a significant spike in visits to pornographic websites between 3.30pm and 7.00pm – the time between young people leaving the school gates and their parents arriving home.

Dr Leonard Sax notes that in addition to being addictive, video games do not engender the resilience or drive that flourishing in the real world requires. If you are playing sport, learning and instrument or involved in other cultural activities, you will experience failure and disappointment and go through tough times. Each time we experience these difficulties we learn from the experience and consequently we become more resilient. When you lose in a video game you hit reset and start over again. There is learning in this, but the message is very different.

Kardaras refers to screens as 'digital heroin' given the similarities in the effects their use has on the brain.

Exposure to technology is essential for our young men. They are growing up in, and will go on to work in, a world that is becoming increasingly tech driven. However, it is essential that the manner in which they are exposed to this technology is controlled and monitored so that the benefits are not diminished by the proven negatives.

As a school we have been very deliberate in our approach to the incorporation of digital technology in our curriculum and teaching programmes. Digital technology provides educators with a range of incredibly powerful tools. However, our approach as a school is that IT is just that – a tool. One that should be used when appropriate in the classroom, and one that will be more appropriate for certain topics and for certain subjects on some occasions, but less appropriate in other subject areas and at other times. We understand how essential it is that young men develop the necessary skills to use digital technologies. We also understand how essential it is that young men develop problem solving, communication, interpersonal, relational and teamwork skills, and there are many ways in which these can be developed through the use of both traditional and contemporary pedagogies.

The Impact of Digital Distraction

Increasingly we are finding that young men who come to prominence through poor behaviour, poor attendance or academic underachievement are exhibiting concerning behaviour in relation to their use of screens, in most cases this relates to gaming and social media use. "Loves Me Not" programme for Year 12

In 2008, the horrific murder of Sophie Elliott by her former boyfriend and tu-



tor, Clayton Weatherston, shocked New Zealand. Following her death Sophie's mother, Lesley Elliott, quickly realised that if they had both missed the signs of an abusive relationship so could many others. So with the help of the Police she developed a programme called 'Loves-Me-Not' for Year 12 students.

Thursday 7th September the Year 12 students at PNBHS completed the programme which included exploring healthy relationships and the sometimes difficult subject of relationship abuse and consent with the long-term outcome, that young people live their lives free from the harm of unhealthy and abusive relationships.

'Loves-Me-Not' focuses on healthy (equal)

relationships as opposed to unhealthy (controlling) ones.

The programme was facilitated by Police, Non-Government Organisations and staff from PNBHS.

From this programme, the students will be able to:

- recognise qualities of good relationships
- recognise early signs of relationship abuse
- understand sexual consent, what it means, and why they need it
- apply critical thinking about who is advantaged by societal myths, and how these myths may perpetuate relationship abuse and acts of sexual abuse
- explore if, when and how to be an active bystander
- 'take action for change' for themselves, their friends and family, and the wider community to have safer communities together.

At the end of the day, the Police gave a copy of Lesley's book to everyone. The book includes advice and suggestions on how to identify problems, how to deal with them and where to seek help.

Twenty years of Super Eight School's competition

The NZSES was the brainchild of Chris Grinter, headmaster of Rotorua Boys'. He called a meeting of every state school from the North Island and received a lot of expressions of interest. Several schools such as Wesley College and Whangerei Boys' had to concede transport was too much of a hurdle. It was then decided to invite only State Boys' schools.

The final eight schools were: Hamilton, Tauranga, Rotorua, New Plymouth, Gisborne, Napier, Hastings and Palmerston North.

Over the years this sporting competition has evolved to accommo-

date cultural activities as well with the introduction of Kapa Haka, debating and chess.

The NZSES competitions have proven to produce top teams and a direct pathway



post school into higher honours.. The performance of teams like Hastings Boys' 1st XV, Palmerston North Boys' Prem A Basketball team and New Plymouth Boys' Cross Country teams show boys no longer need to seek out scholarships at some of the private or 'cashed up' State schools to advance in their careers.
