From the Rector



Dear Parents

At a recent assembly, I read an excerpt from the book *The Winning Mindset*, by Professor Damian Hughes. In a section of the book devoted to the power of simplicity, Professor Hughes discusses the impact of interruption, and the sheer weight of information we are faced with on a daily basis, on our ability to concentrate. Research has revealed that compared to 1960, we are now consuming three times as much information, "but that by 2020 we will be generating forty-four times more data than we are today".

This incessant bombardment has created a number of issues. The interruption caused by continuous disruptions is significant - "on average, computer users change windows and check email or another programme thirty-seven times an hour," says Professor Hughes. "Often", he says, "It can feel like there is no room in our heads to stop and think". Many of us will know exactly how that feels.

The effect of such incessant disruption has been shown to have a detrimental impact on IQ: a leading clinical psychiatrist has "posited that the combined effect of incessant phone calls and emails can lead to a temporary drop in our IQ of an extraordinary and disturbing ten points".

Barry Schwartz, who wrote The Paradox of Choice, notes, "We become overloaded. Choice no longer liberates, it debilitates. It might even be said to tyrannise".

We see the effect of this on our young men. The ability to focus or concentrate for any great length of time is being eroded, as is, in some cases, the ability to remain self-motivated. For many of our junior pupils, who have recently completed their first set of school examinations, sitting in one place and concentrating for two hours will have been a significant challenge. Yet it is a skill that they must develop as they work towards the senior school and external examinations, and a skill they will be required to demonstrate throughout their lives.

They will have learned some important lessons about how to prepare for exams – and removing the disruptions and interruptions for extended periods of time will be an important step towards improving their ability to focus.

Term II is often demanding for the young men of the school, particularly for those who are heavily involved in co-curricular activities. Assessments, trainings, rehearsals, not to mention jobs and other teenage "stuff" makes for a very busy term. Added to that mix are the cold and wet winter months and the 'flu season. It is therefore imperative that our young men look after themselves – get enough rest and sleep well, eat properly, prioritise what is important. Sometimes, a bit of grit is required to ensure obligations and commitments are met, and that motivation and focus are maintained.

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Rector's Administrative Notices

NCEA Level One

Thank you to those parents who attended the recent meeting regarding the proposed changes to the NCEA Level 1 course. Thank you also to the large number who took the time to contact us with comments and queries. It has been heartening to see so many parents taking an active interest in their son's schooling. The feedback has been most useful and has been overwhelmingly supportive. Indeed, such was the number of responses from the school community that a decision will be able to be made in the near future. June 8 will be the final date for submissions in this regard. The conversation has now spread to other schools in the area, and there is now some discussion about the proposal being region-wide after a number of schools expressed an interest in following a similar path.

Reporting

Teaching staff will begin preparing mid-year reports for all students over the coming weeks. Reports will be posted to parents at the end of the term. In the interim, I encourage you to discuss your son's examination and assessment results with him and where need arises do not hesitate to communicate with us. I encourage you to do the same when you receive his mid-year report.

Winter Sport

There are a significant number of young men playing winter sports codes and we have worked fervently to get a staff member as a coach or manager. As you can appreciate, this is a major undertaking for the school and I sincerely thank those staff and senior students who have given so freely of their time to maintain an essential part of our school life. I also thank parents and volunteers who are assisting with teams as this allows your sons to have the best coaching we have available. We have been most fortunate to attract passionate people with the boys' best interests at heart.

It has been interesting to hear from coaches of responses to the selection or non-selection of boys in various teams. These decisions are made objectively, and not everyone will agree. That is the nature of team selection. Selection for a number of our teams is very competitive, perhaps even more so than some age-group rep sides, where factors other than ability can be influential. A number of our young men will be disappointed, as will parents on their behalf, which is natural; but the reactions of some have been disappointing. Determination and resilience are called for in these instances.

Please remember that full and correct sporting uniform needs to be worn for all fixtures. We do not allow young men to have skins or similar clothing visible underneath their sports uniform. We have also reminded young men that it is our expectation that their socks are pulled up on the sports field and that the uniform is being worn correctly and with pride. We appreciate your support as standards are set in all aspects of school life. A further reminder that if a young man is away from school the day prior or day page 3

of a sporting fixture, he is ineligible to play.

Inter-School Fixtures and Field Trips

Before an inter-school fixture or field trip departs it is expected that any costs associated with the trip are paid in full to the Finance Office. Young men who have not paid will not have permission to go on the trip, as is the case with the completion of appropriate documentation such as permission slips. Again, we appreciate your support in being up to date with all school fees.

Young men in 1st sporting teams and those in our top performing arts groups are expected to attend both home and away fixtures in full formal uniform (No. 1's). It is expected that all members have their own formal uniform, including blazer. This allows the school's hire blazers to be utilised by those who do not regularly wear the formal uniform. Senior blazers can be ordered by seeing Mrs Alderdice in the Uniform Outlet.

For those young men wishing to hire blazers for 'one off' occasions a refundable deposit and associated fee is charged. Mrs Dearlove in The Speirs Centre can provide more information about this service.

Attendance

Please remember to ring the Attendance Officer to record an absence prior to the day or the day of an absence. The Attendance Officer will thus not need to ring you to check why your son is not at school.

When your son returns to school please provide him with a signed note that he needs to give to me after assembly. These notes allow our Attendance Officer to check the absence and confirm your son's return to school.

Staffing

We have been fortunate to have former staff member Mrs Berry return to the English and Classics departments. Mrs Lowry is now on maternity leave and Dr O'Connor has retired. It is often difficult finding replacement staff during the year but all classes will be covered and appointments will be made where necessary in due course.

School Fees & Donations

School fees and donations for 2018 have been sent to parents from our finance department. If you have specific questions about fees or the payment of a donation do not hesitate to talk to us.

Each year as fees and donations are due for distribution the media and Ministry of Education do disseminate information suggesting that schools are well funded and that education is, or at least should be, free in this country. Unfortunately, the level of funding we as a school receive is inadequate and so the payment of donations and other fees is vital.

The school donations allow us to be the school we are. Specifically, without the donations we could not offer the depth in teaching at the school. Currently the Board of

Trustees budgets a significant amount for additional teachers, so that we can offer a wide breadth in our teaching subjects and this allows more subjects to have pathways from the junior school through to Year 13. Without paying for extra teachers we would have to reduce what we offer young men inside and outside the class-

room.

School donations help put resources into curriculum areas and co-curricular areas and every dollar does help us to provide a high quality education. I would encourage you to support your son's education and Palmerston North Boys' High School by paying the donations. Remember, too, that the

donation component is tax deductible.

Many parents are now paying by automatic payment on a regular basis that suits them. Our finance team will happily work with you to make arrangements and payment schedules that suit your individual needs. Thank you for your support.

his secondary schooling. Parents can play an essential role in making the most of these examinations. Rather than simply fixating on results – was it a 'pass' or a 'fail' – engage with your son in discussions about his examina-



tion preparation – which strategies did he find most helpful? What will he do differently in the future? How will he attempt to accelerate his learning and progress in the second half of the year? Working with him to set goals will assist his academic progress and reinforce the high expectations you have for his academic progress.

Academic Presentations

At a recent assembly, young men who gained NCEA qualifications endorsed with Excellence in 2017 were recognised. Those who achieved NCEA Level One endorsed with Excellence were presented with New Zealand Super Eight Schools certificates. A presentation was also made to Ronan Carroll and Jarod Govers, who both gained Scholarship passes in English in 2017 as Year 12 students. Scholarship Passes in English:



Scholarship

We encourage all young men studying NCEA Level Three subjects to consider sitting scholarship assessments. NZQA explain that "New Zealand Scholarship provides recognition and monetary reward for the highest achieving secondary school students. Scholarship is assessed against demanding standards to challenge the most capable students in each subject area. Scholarship candidates are expected to demonstrate high-level critical thinking, and to integrate, synthesise and apply knowledge, skills, understanding and ideas to complex situations."

Scholarship requires a significant extra commitment in terms of revision and examination preparation. Many departments will run additional tutorials to assist with this. However, for some young men the extra time required may be an impediment to their success at NCEA Level 3 and in gaining University Entrance. For this reason, we encourage all young men contemplating enrolling in Scholarship to dis-

cuss this with their parents and teachers so that an informed decision is made. If your son wishes to enrol for Scholarship examinations, he must complete the entry form available from the Finance Office, and return this with the \$30 per subject entry fee. International students considering entering Scholarship examinations should discuss this with Mr Retemeyer or Mr van Stipriaan.

What does it mean to be a man?

There has been much in the media in recent months that portrays men in a negative light. The 'toxic masculinity' and appalling behaviour that has given rise to the likes of the #MeToo movement are unacceptable and, for the good of our society, cannot be tolerated. It is essential that the messages young men receive are ones that encourage positive behaviour and respectful attitudes to all members of our society. Given the very mixed messages that are communicated through contemporary media, especially social media, and the default sex and relationship education many young men receive via internet pornography, the extent to which any such positive messages might emerge is concerning.

Towards the end of Term 1, I met with a small randomly selected group of young men in Year 13 and posed two questions to them; firstly, what does society tell you about what it means to be a man? And, secondly, what do you believe it means to be a man? Their responses, in their words, are summarised in the chart right.

The purpose of this exercise was not to judge what is 'right' or 'wrong' in terms of our young men's aspirations and ideas about their roles in the future, merely to gauge in some small way whether or not there were differences in what they thought society expected of them, compared to their expectations for themselves for the future. While there are a number of similarities between the two lists above, there are also some key differences. It is concerning that, when asked about societal expectations, many traditional stereotypical gender role expectations were identified - make more money than women, be confident, be rich, be popular. This is counterbalanced to some extent by the ambitions that these young men had for themselves - have a moral code, be loving, be humble, be compromising.

Messages about the need to 'man up' and be emotionally strong are likewise concerning. Previously we have shared statistics about the very concerning nature of the mental health of young people in New Zealand today, surely evidence enough that the 'man up' approach is not working? We believe very strongly that young men should be encouraged

to share their concerns. Ideally this would be with a parent, or another adult in their lives they have a close connection to. Does your son feel comfortable having such conversations with you? If not, who would you like him to place his trust in? Have you had this discussion with him?

I hope that this information might be a trigger for some conversations with your son about what thinks it means to be a man, and what your hopes, aspirations and expectations might be in this regard. When I met with this Year 13 group, I also enquired how many had ever had a conversation with an adult about what it means to be a man. Only two of the group indicated that they had been involved in such a conversation.

'Who' our young men go on to become in the future is too important to be left to chance. If we are unwilling or unable to engage with young men about what it means to be a man, they will be 'educated' in this respect from a range of other influences. The messages they do receive are likely to be mixed and will no doubt include perspectives and ideas that are at odds with the values we hope they choose to live by.

We encourage you engage in these conversations, as in doing so you help your son realise the very positive role that he can play in the future of our society.

Recently we shared a post on the school Facebook page about the current second season of 13 Reasons Why. Included was this: "When we bring up hard topics with our kids and teens, even if you muddle your way through them, you are giving them direct evidence that you can handle challenging subjects. The result then is that they are more likely to come to you in the future when they face challenges. If we don't bring up issues related to all sorts of topics that come up in sexual lives, relationships in general, mental health, etc., then our kids are much more likely to look for answers on the internet or from peers—or no one at all—rather than sharing their concerns with us." While this statement related specifically to 13 Reasons Why, it is a message that can be applied to all areas of life.

Character

The development of our Character Education framework is continuing. Thank you to those in our community who provided feedback when our Graduate Profile was shared with you. This document encapsulates our school values and provides some indication of what this might 'look like' from a school and student perspective. The next step for us is to identify those aspects of school life in which character education is strongly embedded as a focus, and then to share and build on that good practice.

Developing Educated Men of Outstanding Character cannot happen in isolation. We hope that by emphasising our school values – courage, humility, industry, integrity, pride and respect – we are able to work with families to help in the development of young men who will make a positive difference in our community, and whom we can be proud of as our future leaders and parents.




Old Boy Shay Ashworth at Head Prefect's Assembly

New Zealand Association of Language Teachers Certificates of Excellence Awards for 2017

Each year the New Zealand Association of Language Teachers rewards high-achieving students, who sit NCEA Levels 1, 2 and 3 Chinese, French, German, Japanese and Spanish as a second language, with a Certificate of Excellence to recognise their achievements.

In each Level 1, Level 2 and Level 3 language course, there are five Achievement Standards which involve listening, reading, speaking and writing. To qualify for a Certificate of Excellence, 14 or more credits at Excellence level, including at least 3 from externally assessed Standards and 3 from internally assessed standards, are required.

Grades for the 2017 NCEA internal and external assessments resulted in eight PNBHS students qualifying for Certificates of Excellence.

PNBHS visits NASA in Houston, USA

Five young men from PNBHS experienced the 'trip of a life-time' during the recent school holidays, visiting NASA in Houston. Finn Martin, Xavier Bowe, John Cole, Sean Ferguson-Pye and Wade Talatala are all part of the Pūhoro STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) Academy. The academy, set up by Massey University with Te Puni Kōkiri support, fosters young Māori



school pupils from Year 11 on their journey through to university, and ultimately the workforce. The programme works to engage with teachers and whanau to support the students' science study and to build a wider community of Pūhoro students who share their passion for science. Thanks to Xavier for providing the report below:

"On the 16th of April, myself and 14 other students flew to Houston, Texas, thanks to the Puhoro STEM Academy and sponsors.

We were in Houston for 10 days, and we always seemed to be doing something.

On Tuesday and Wednesday, we went to NASA to the Johnson Space Centre (JSC). On Tuesday we were taken around different facilities at the campus by a man named Irwin. He took us to see things such as a full size space station (in bits), and a robot called Valkyrie which they are working on to send to Mars. They are working on it being able to handle the terrain, and be able to walk heel to toe as a human does to increase walking speed. On Wednesday,



we looked around the museum and bought things at the gift shop. They had some cool interactive things to do, as well as things to look at and read about.

On Thursday

morning we went to the Lone Star Flight Museum, where we learnt about different aspects of aviation, like flight dynamics. We learnt about pre-flight checks, what types of navigation is used and when they are used. We then got to fly a plane on a simulator. It was cool to get a taste of what it is like for pilots, but not quite the real thing.

In the afternoon we went to the First Robotics competition, where we looked around at the innovation fair, talking to people from different fields.

On Friday we went to Six Flags, San Antonio, which is a return five hour drive, which we did in the same day, but it was worth it.

Saturday morning we went back to the First Robotics, and watched some of the competition. It was cool to see the robots and what they could do and that this had all been achieved by school kids. In the late afternoon/night time, we went to a local pow wow, a gathering of native American tribes. It was really cool to be immersed in their culture, and to learn some dances. We did a Kapa Haka performance for them.

The Sunday was a bit of a sleep in day, and then we had a Native American family over at our house, as well as a storyteller, and they showed us some dancing and taught us about their culture. We then performed some Kapa Haka for them.



On Monday morning we went to a rocket company called Ad Astra, which was founded by Franklin Chang-Diaz in 2005. Ad Astra is developing a rocket engine that uses advanced plaza propul-

sion technology. Mr Chang-Diaz is a former astronaut and has flown into space 7 times, the most times ever.

In the afternoon we went to the Houston Museum of Natural Science, and we took part in a simulation which involved flying to the moon, and then too Mars. On Tuesday morning we went to J.D Hudgins cattle ranch, where we met a fifth generation rancher. The cattle there were Brahmin cattle, which were interesting to see as we don't have them in New Zealand and they look



different to our cattle. At night we went to a baseball game at the Minute Maid Park where the Houston Astros were playing the Los Angeles Angels. We flew back Wednesday night and arrived back in New Zealand and straight away felt the cold."

'Sex with Attitude' Presentation

We were privileged recently to host Nate and Brayden from Attitude – the youth education division of Parenting Place – who made presentations to our young men, focused around wellbeing.

For young men in the senior school the presentations covered 'Sex with Attitude' with a focus on developing healthy relationships and breaking down myths about sex. There was a particular emphasis on safely navigating the cyber world – the impact of pornography on relationships, sexting and how to keep yourself safe in the increasingly complex online world.



At Year 10 the emphasis was on drugs, particularly alcohol. Why do people feel the need to use drugs? What strategies can you use to keep yourself and your mates safe?

For young men in Year 9 the focus was general health and wellbeing – hauora. What are the physical, mental, social and spiritual dimensions of wellbeing and how can these be used to develop resilience?

We encourage parents to engage in conversations with their sons about the presentations today so that they become more than simply a 'one off' event.

These presentations build on content delivered at school, in particular through the Health curriculum. Additionally, at Years 9, 10 and 11 we partner with

ACC and the DHB who deliver the Mates and Dates programme, while the Police and a range of other agencies deliver the Loves Me Not programme at Year 12.

"Attitude – the youth education division of Parenting Place – is dedicated to equipping teenagers with the information and skills they need to negotiate the adolescent years and build meaningful lives. The materials, based on credible research and linked to the health curriculum, give young people strategies for solving problems, handling stress, building resilience and negotiating relationships."

"Modelled events model real life situations or events and their diplomatic effects. They are events that develop civics education, public speaking, teamwork and critical thinking skills.

One of the main operational groups that runs these events is UNYouth. They are the primary operators of the well-known Auckland Youth Declaration.

Eight young men from PNBHS (and 2 others from the Palmerston North region) attended the event in Christchurch having generously received about \$1800 in travel, food and accommodation support. They stayed in shared bunk rooms at the Christchurch YHA

with other students at the event. The event was attended by approximately 120 students from all over the country.

Later this term we will be calling for junior students who wish to audition for the Junior Play, also a part of Showcase.


Drama Trips are featuring heavily over the next few weeks. By the time this goes to print, three will have been completed.

TE ARAROA TRAIL FUND-RAISER FOR RONALD MCDONALD HOUSE











The Te Araroa challenge was set up to test our students both physically and mentally and to allow our school community to support and give back to a charity that helps New Zealand families during their own challenging circumstances. Ronald McDonald House was the charity of choice for the Boys' High community to raise money. This charity has impacted positively on many families in our Palmy Boys' community, along with other families throughout New Zealand.

The task to run the length of the North Island using the Te Araroa trail was an ideal environment to challenge our students. The trail covered over 1700km of off-road trails and public roads. To achieve this challenge we had groups of runners completing sections of the trail. The first group ran from Cape Reinga to Auckland, the second group from Auckland to National Park. the third group from National Park to Whanganui, the fourth group from Whanganui to Palmerston North and the last group ran from Palmerston to Wellington. Each group consisted of 10-15 runners along with the 4-5 staff.

Once the relay began on Tuesday 3 April at Cape Reinga the team ran between 100 to 140 kilometres each day. The trail went through spectacular landscapes from beaches to volcanoes to forests and cities. Finally, after 15 days running, the team ran into Island Bay, Wellington to finish the length of the North Island. Before we ran the last 5km the group had the chance to visit Ronald McDonald House. It was great to have the opportunity to see where the money we fundraised would be used.

Throughout the journey, our students and staff meet many amazing people who were willing to help the team along the way. Some people encouraged us with motivating words, others donated money or supplied the group with a more than needed hot meal. All involved appreciated the generosity and support that others offered us and lifelong lessons were learnt by the group of the importance of doing things for others.

Throughout this time, the students involved did an amazing job at representing Palmerston North Boys' High and Ronald McDonald House community. The dedication and commitment all students showed while participating was extraordinary and I would like to congratulate all students involved. The way that all students embraced this challenge in a positive manner was a real highlight for the staff involved.





Stolen? Or Simply Left Behind!

In the past few weeks we have had a number of young men, and their parents, extremely concerned about stolen property – jackets, jerseys etc. The school takes theft extremely seriously and will do what it can to solve cases of theft. The consequences for anyone caught stealing at Palmerston North Boys' High School will be severe.

However, please note that almost all of the recent cases of reported theft have, in fact, not been theft at all. In nearly every case, the young men have simply left their clothing or bag behind and the property had been handed in to the Student Support Centre. This is despite the fact that the students were adamant that their "gear" had been stolen and they had



told their parents that this was the case.

If your son believes his property has been stolen, it is essential that he reports this.

However, he first needs to check in at the Student Support Centre to see if it has been handed in. Most property left behind usually "turns up" within a few days. Another good task is to go around his previous classrooms and teachers and see if he has simply left his clothing in a previous lesson, as this is very common.

The amount of clothing that is simply left around the school on a daily basis is staggering. The majority of what you see in these photos comprises the clothing handed in to the Student Support Centre within one to two days only.
